BBC Bias Against Brexit: News-watch surveys since the 2016 referendum

Since the EU Referendum on 23/06/216 News-watch has compiled 11 reports, conducted under accepted academic principles. These reports stretch to 1,583 pages analysis of 81 hours of the BBC's post-referendum Brexit coverage.

There has been only one programme which has examined the opportunities of Brexit. N.B. not 'promoted' those opportunities; just explored them.

The surveys show that the BBC has put Brexit under sustained negative attack since the Referendum, through inequality in the time given to interviewees, choice of story, and 'bias by omission.' For instance, the BBC has not considered whether the ideas behind the 'project' of European integration are still valid today.

Going further back, of 4,275 guests talking about the EU on BBC Radio 4's Today programme in survey periods between 2005 and 2015, only 132 (3.2 per cent) were supporters of the UK's withdrawal from the EU.

In 274 hours of monitored BBC EU coverage between 2002 and 2017, only 14 speakers (0.2 per cent of the total) were left-wing advocates for leaving the EU. Yet there was a strong Eurosceptic movement within Labour and the Trade Unions at the time.

¹ Speaker proportions in the 'Total' row are based on the 2,003 speakers who contributed to the 11 surveys, not an average of each column. Across the 11 surveys, 1,045 speakers (52%) were pro-EU or Remain supporters and 549 (27%) speakers were anti-EU or Leave supporters. A further 371 (19%) offered a neutral or factual opinion and, in the most recent two surveys, 38 (2%) spoke in favour of Theresa May's proposed deal with the EU and were categorised separately.
